Latest News About Grand Master's One Day Class And Spring Reunion

Two of the most important Masonic events this year take place side-by-side in April. The *Grand Master's One Day Class* will be held on Saturday, April 9 and the 2005 Spring Reunion (152nd Annual) follows on Saturday, April 16. Both events will be held at the Cincinnati Masonic Center.

The *Grand Master's One Day Class* marks only the third time in the 196-year history of Freemasonry in Ohio that a man can receive all three degrees of Symbolic Masonry and join the Scottish Rite and Shrine all in one day. This new style of initiation was introduced

in 2002 in response to the often-raised objection by many younger men that they cannot give the time required for initiation in the traditional manner. The format on April 9 allows busy, career and family-oriented men the opportunity to enjoy the same benefits of Freemasonry as their fathers and grandfathers before them.

New members will receive outstanding degree work on April 9. The Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason Degrees will be conferred by highly skilled ritualistic teams from the First, Sixth and Seventh Masonic Districts. The Thirty-second Degree of the Scottish Rite will be presented in full ceremonial form following the Symbolic Degrees. The day's events will conclude with the Shrine Ceremonial under the auspices of the Syrian Shrine Divan. (The complete One-Day Class schedule can be found on page 4.)

A convenient all-

inclusive petition form has been designed by the Grand Lodge of Ohio and may be used to apply to the Symbolic Lodge and related appendant bodies for membership. The special form, for this class only, is available from lodge secretaries or the Cincinnati Scottish Rite office at (513) 421-3579.

New members joining the Scottish Rite will receive the Thirty-second Degree on April 9. They will be expected to return on Saturday, April 16 for the 2005 Spring (152nd Annual) Reunion when five degrees (4°, 14°, 15°, 18°, 23°) will be conferred. The 14° ring will be presented to candidates in the traditional manner during the Fourteenth Degree on April 16. (See page 4 for the schedule of the 2005 Spring Reunion.)

The highlight of the Spring Reunion will be the Thirty-second Degree Banquet on April 16 when The Honorable

Spring Reunion Class Named in Memory of Wayne F. White, 33°



The 152nd Annual Spring Reunion Class of the Valley of Cincinnati has been named in memory of one of the pillars of Freemasonry in Southwestern

Ohio, Illustrious Brother Wayne F. White, 33°.

Wayne White was born on July 9, 1942 in Scottown, Ohio. He grew up along Greasy Ridge, a tiny community in southern Ohio

He graduated from Waterloo High School in 1960. He pursued higher education and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education from Ohio University in 1965 and a Masters in Education degree from Morehead State University in 1971.

He was a teacher and coach at Waterloo Grade School and Symmes Valley High School. He received promotion to administrative posts in the Symmes Valley School System including assistant superintendent and later superintendent. After retiring from Symmes Valley he became general supervisor for the Lawrence County Board of Education and then served as superintendent in the Dawson-Bryant district for ten years.

Illustrious Brother White made the greatest impact on education in Ohio when he agreed to serve as the first Executive Director of the Ohio Appalachian Center for Higher Education.

He served on several boards and committees including Star Bank, the River Valley Hospital Board, Lawrence County General Hospital, Buckeye Rural Electric Coop.

Our Illustrious Brother had a distinguished career in Freemasonry. He was raised a Master Mason in Waterloo Lodge No. 532, F. & A.M. on June 29, 1966. He later served as Worshipful Master in 1971, secretary in 1974 and served the Grand Lodge of Ohio as a District Deputy Grand Master of the 12th Masonic District in 1987-1989.

He completed the degrees of the Scottish Rite in the Valley of Cincinnati in the Fall Class of 1988. On September 3, 1995 he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33°, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council at Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Ill. Brother White passed away suddenly September 29, 2004.

It is with great pride and respect that the Valley of Cincinnati names the Spring Class of candidates in memory of our Illustrious Brother Wayne F. White, 33°.

Cathedral Hour Is One of Cincinnati's Most Impressive Easter Observances

The passion and resurrection of Jesus Christ, regarded by many as "the greatest story ever told," is the basis for the unique Easter Cathedral Hour Service presented by the Scottish Rite on **Sunday, March 20, 2005**. The worship service, which originated in 1944, has evolved over the years into its present form which includes a series of beautiful tableaux taken from the King James Version of the Holy Bible.

Calling the sixty-one year old worship series one of the finest programs sponsored by the Scottish Rite, Carl L. Wilson, Most Wise Master of Cincinnati Chapter of Rose Croix, expressed his ap-

preciation for the loyal support of the Palm Sunday service by members and their families. "No matter what the weather, no matter what event may be in conflict, the cathedral is always full for this magnificent service. It is a testament to both the high quality of the service and also to the tremendous base of support we enjoy, for which we are extremely grateful," commented Wilson.

The Easter Cathedral Hour Service, which begins at 3:30 p.m. in the Scottish Rite Cathedral, 317 East Fifth Street, is open to the public. Masons, members of the Eastern Star and their families are particularly encouraged to attend. Tickets are not required.

Music plays an integral part in the Cathedral Hour service. The renowned Scottish Rite Cathedral Choir, under the direction of Edward F. Howard, 33° has prepared an excellent program which includes *I See His Blood Upon the Rose* by Hugh S. Robertson and *There on a Cross* by Benjamin Harlan. The service traditionally concludes with Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* from the *Messiah*.

Seating for the service begins at 2:00 p.m. In addition to on street parking, convenient parking is available at the Procter & Gamble Garage, located one block north of the Cincinnati Masonic Center on Sixth Street.

Secretary of State J. Kenneth Blackwell, 33° To Speak at 32° Banquet April 16



J. Kenneth Blackwell has a distinguished record of achievement as an educator, diplomat and finance executive.

Ill.: Brother Blackwell's public service includes terms as Mayor of Cincinnati, an undersecretary at the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development and U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Human Rights Commission. In 1994 he was elected Treasurer of State.

He holds Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degrees from Xavier University where he later served as a vice-president and member of its faculty. He has

been a Fellow at Harvard University's Institute of Politics, the Aspen Institute, the Salzburg Seminar in Austria and the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University (British-American Project). His continuing education has included executive programs at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard.

His commentaries have been carried in major newspapers across the United States, including *The Wall Street Journal* and *The New York Times*, as well as all major newspapers in Ohio. He is a contributing commentator for Salem Communications, delivering commentaries on more than 90 radio stations nationwide. He

also has been a frequent guest on network and broadcast news and public affairs programs, including *The O'Reilly Factor*, *Crossfire*, *Inside Politics*, *The Jim Lehrer News Hour*, and *Hardball* with Chris Matthews.

J. Kenneth Blackwell is currently serving as Secretary of State for the State of Ohio where he is Ohio's chief election officer.

Ill.: Brother Blackwell is a lifelong resident of Cincinnati. He is a prominent member of Freemasonry, and is a 33° Scottish Rite Mason of the Prince Hall affiliation. The Valley of Cincinnati is honored that he will be present at the 152nd Annual Spring Reunion to speak at the 32° Banquet.

The Knights Templar, the Freemasons and *The Da Vinci Code*

Tuesday, April 5, 2005 at 7:00 p.m., a lecture, "The Knights Templar, the Freemasons and *The Da Vinci Code*," will be presented in Lodge Room 1 on the fourth floor of the Cincinnati Masonic Center. Donald I. Crews, 32° will present the lecture on behalf of the Cincinnati Masonic Library and the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County. The program is free and open to the public.

The Da Vinci Code by Dan Brown is amongst the most successful published works of the last 10 years. The book, which was published in March 2003, has been on the New York Times Bestseller List ever since.

While it is a work of fiction, the author purports much of it to be true. Because the book touches on some of the most basic beliefs of the Christian church and history, it has caused excitement and controversy. The premise of the story is that a secret order exists to protect an "earth shattering" secret. Murder, codes and ciphers, as well as chases through Paris and London, serve as a backdrop to the story as the secret is revealed.

The lecture, originally created by Brother Crews as one part of a series of lectures about *The Da Vinci Code* presented at the Main Branch of the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County in the Fall of 2004, deals with the Knights Templar, not the Masonic Order but the religious

order of the Crusades, as they are described in the book. Freemasonry has a smaller role, though statements are made about the fraternity in the book.

Crews recently stated, "With a keen interest in Freemasonry and the Knights Templar, the area on which I chose to concentrate seemed obvious. The book paints a particular picture of both the Templars and the Masons. The relationship between *The Da Vinci Code's* depiction of these groups and their depiction in other sources is the main thrust of the lecture."

The Cincinnati Masonic Library, located in the Cincinnati Masonic Center, is in the process of reorganizing and revitalizing. A major portion of the collection has been inventoried, cleaned and a professional cataloging effort is now underway to make the collection more usable and to assure that the collection is maintained for the future.

"We are making real progress," according to President Art Koeniger. "This lecture, the first public program sponsored by the library in memory, is representative of the type of activity that supports the purpose of the Cincinnati Masonic Library. It is also a privilege for us to work with the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County. We look forward to a good turnout for this program."
